COMMISSIONERS' CORNER

In past newsletters the Board of Fire Commissioners discussed the physical plant needs of the Leverich Place headquarters building constructed in 1958. Volume 3 Number 1 revealed the repairs, renovations and modernization required to meet today's firematic standards. Subsequent newsletters established costs, and the sale of bonds proved to be the only feasible funding avenue. On December 10, 2012, residents of the Huntington Fire District voted to approve the bond issue.

Keeping Promises:

During our October 2012 presentation on the need to issue bonds, the Board promised to keep residents abreast of progress. In this issue we're pleased to include photos that show the progress being made on the Main Headquarters and the Annex.

Headquarters:

At Headquarters, the footing, floors and block walls have been completed on the front of the building. This will dramatically increase the size and capacity of the Dispatcher's office (first floor), the Department Chief's office (second floor) and the rear of the building as well. The rear area, which is one story, will house the training and physical fitness area. It will also have dedicated space for a larger District Manager's office, shower area and the sleeping quarters needed for standbys.

Annex:

Across the street at the annex, the footing and block wall have been completed on the East and West ends. These additions will give the Fire Department a dedicated training area and provide much needed Fire District storage space.

We will keep you posted on all progress.



Making It Happen: Building Progress Report

If you see dust clouds in the area of Leverich Place, rest assured it's not a tornado! It's the new firehouse under construction. There hasn't been so much building activity at 1 Leverich Place since...well, since the headquarters was constructed in 1958! Thanks to the Huntington community's positive vote on our bond issue, renovations and additions are underway...and they're right on schedule.

In late August the shovels broke ground, and the new site preparation began. One key objective was to get all additions constructed and closed in before the winter weather arrives.

The foundations for the dispatcher's area, shop and training facility were poured and back filled. Next came the masons, and the block and brick walls began to take

shape. In fact, they may be complete by the time you read this publication. In the interior, electricians are busy running conduit throughout for all electrical upgrades, and soon a new generator will be installed.

All trades are on schedule with their work.


The Huntington Fire Department has been in existence for 170 years, and I am proud to have served my community and to be a part of Huntington's history.

RECOGNIZING THE HEROISM IN OUR RANKS SUFFOLK COUNTY FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

As a result of his bravery on the job, Chief Ken Cochrane was voted Suffolk County Fireman of the Year.

On June 15, 2012, at 8:55 p.m. the Huntington Fire Department responded to a reported structure fire at the Nathan Hale Apartment Complex, located at 44 Nathan Hale Drive in Huntington.

A neighbor advised Chief Cochrane of an occupant inside the affected first floor apartment. Within seconds of arrival, Suffolk County Police officer Joseph Lanzisera entered the apartment through a living room window and met Chief Ken Cochrane and Assistant Chief Bob Berry who had gained entry through the front door. None of those entering the apartment were wearing their Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA's) or protective gear at the time of entry.

Chief Cochrane and Officer Lanzisera were forced to pass the fire through a hallway and quickly located

the victim, an 84 year-old disabled woman. The men carried her out of her bedroom to safety while Assistant Chief Berry suppressed the fire with a water can before the first Engine arrived on the scene.

Though a relatively small blaze, both Chief Cochrane and Officer Lanzisera were confronted with very heavy toxic smoke due to burning plastics and carpeting.

The victim was found covered in black soot and sustained 2nd degree burns to her head, face and hair as well as smoke inhalation. Both the victim and Officer Lanzisera were taken by ambulance to Huntington Hospital for sustained injuries and smoke inhalation.

After more than a month in the hospital, the victim has fully recovered from her injuries and is back home. Without Chief Cochrane's quick, heroic actions, the outcome of this incident would have been much different.
