COMMISSIONERS' CORNER

one primary responsibility of fire commissioners is to protect tax monies collected from taxpayers. Protection begins with the selection of a Treasurer, someone who must possess high ethical standards and a financial background. Equally important is the development of procedures with good checks and balances to ensure the integrity of all expenditures and security of the District's assets.

The Process:

- The Treasurer prepares a monthly report listing all bills to be approved for payment.
- Each bill listed is attached and presented for payment.
- Every bill requires a purchase order which requests permission to purchase or contract for services.
- Vendors must prepare and submit the District's voucher and any other documentation required or requested.

Each bill presented must be approved by a majority of the Board before payment is made. After approval, **ALL** commissioners must sign the voucher. The Treasurer then authorizes preparation of a check. The check is then signed by the Treasurer and a Commissioner.



SAFETY TIPS

The fire death rate in homes with working smoke alarms is over 50% lower than those with working smoke alarms. The U.S. Fire Administration and the American Red Cross recommend these simple safety steps:

- Install smoke alarms on every level of your home and outside sleeping areas.
- 2 Test alarms monthly.
- Replace batteries annually or any time you hear a cricket-like 'chirping.'
- 4 Clean smoke alarms so they are dust and debris free by vacuuming over and around them.
- Install smoke alarms away from windows, doors or ducts that could interfere with operation.
- **6** Practice a family home fire escape plan.
- 7 Alarms wear out. Replace them every 10 years.




