Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP)

he Length of Service Award Program (LOSAP) is an extremely important program designed to retain and reward volunteer firefighters for years of service to their local communities.

The Huntington Fire District requested and received taxpayer approval for a LOSAP program in 1990. The benefit granted was \$20.00 for each year of service up to a maximum of forty (40) years. A member could start receiving this benefit only when he or she reached the entitlement age of 65.

This coming December, the Board of Fire Commissioners will ask the Huntington Fire District taxpayers to improve the existing LOSAP plan by increasing the annual stipend from \$20.00 to \$30.00 for each year of service. Voting on this important matter will be held on Tuesday, December 10, 2019, at the Leverich Place firehouse. Your approval will assist all eligible and future eligible firefighters, and it will also aid in recruiting new members to serve our great community.

LOSAP Background:

In 1998, the New York State legislature passed legislation that authorized fire districts to enact a Length of Service Award Program. The legislation did not impose this, but enabled local municipalities to implement LOSAP with the express approval of the taxpayers of each individual fire district.

Since the original legislation was enacted, several amendments were made



to the law which allowed for some improvements in Length of Service Award Programs. One change allowed volunteers to

start to receive their benefit at an earlier age. (In 2010, the Huntington Fire District proposed lowering the Entitlement Age to 60 years of age. This was put to vote and the taxpayers approved this recommendation).

LOSAP: A Brief Look

In 1990, after Huntington Fire District taxpayers voted to begin a Length of Service Award Program, the Board of Fire Commissioners chose an actuary and a provider for the plan's financial and administrative services. The program commenced in 1991. Several years later an analysis showed that the plan could be improved by going from a fixed annuity plan to an equity investment package. A Request for Proposal (RFP) was published and, as a result, a new actuary and investment firm were retained.

This change has proved to be very successful. After consultation with our actuary, the assumed rate of return established by the Board, was 6.5%. This rate has been met every year since, the exception being 2018, due to a stock market anomaly in December of that year. This consistent success has enabled the Huntington Fire District to keep the budgetary allocation for this plan to less than 5% of the total budget, an outcome that will remain true even with the proposed plan improvement increasing the annual stipend.

Fire Facts & Safety Tips

n a given year, more than 25,000 people are injured and over 4,000 people are killed in fires in the USA alone. Fire devastation costs approximately \$10 billion annually, and the worst part is that the majority of these tragedies could have been prevented by observing and practicing the following rules:



Never go back inside a burning building for any reason.	DON'T
Do not overload electrical extension cords or outlets.	DON'T
Never use space heaters near combustible or flammable materials.	DON'T
Smoking is the leading cause of civilian home fire deaths. Never smoke in bed, or better yet, inside a house or building.	DON'T
Cooking equipment is the leading cause of home structure fires and fire injuries. Be careful when cooking!	DON'T
Using a barbecue or storing propane indoors is an invitation to disaster. Don't do it!	DON'T
Never use gasoline, charcoal lighter or other fuel to light/relight a fire. Vapors can explode!	DON'T
