OBSERVING NFPA STANDARDS

There are few, if any, institutions that are more a part of their communities than volunteer fire

departments. Yet some taxpayers question the size of firehouses and substations or the number of fire trucks, or even the type of equipment used. Few taxpayers realize that volunteer fire departments must adhere to the same standards as major municipal fire departments like the New York City FD. These important standards originate with the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), the organization that researches and reviews all aspects of firefighting and safety issues. Established in 1896, the NFPA is a global, self-funded, nonprofit organization devoted to the elimination of death, injury, property and economic loss due to fire, electrical and related hazards.

The leadership of both professional and volunteer fire departments pay close attention to ensure compliance with all NFPA standards, especially when a fire station is to be built or renovated. NFPA standards apply to key elements from site location to types of equipment to the fire trucks that will be housed therein. Failure to meet the NFPA standards can dramatically affect taxpayers who could potentially experience increased insurance costs, and fire districts which could be exposed to increased liabilities. This is why all fire departments, both professional and volunteer, follow the standards established by the NFPA.






Milestones

the job Tom received a Medal of Honor award from NYC Mayor Edward Koch for saving a woman from a burning building in Queens .

Tom was first elected Commissioner in 1992. During his 30 years of service to the Huntington community, Tom was widely respected as a hardworking and determined individual. The proprietor of Collins Electrical Contracting, Tom was still active at the time of his passing. Recently reelected Fire Commissioner in 2021, Tom's guidance, foresight and affability will be missed by all.





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
Fire Facts & Safety Tips


















Never go back inside a burning building for any reason.

Never use space heaters near combustible or flammable materials.


Smoking is the leading cause of civilian home fire deaths. Never smoke in bed, or better yet, inside a house or building.
